 - a. County Manager Report, Sunny Bryant, County Manager

Manager Bryant reported on March 15th she and the commissioners attended a progress meeting with various groups for the Hayden Pass Fire Recovery to discuss funding. On March 17th Fremont County employees and various members throughout the community had the opportunity to attend a session at the Florence High school called "The Question Behind the Question," a program calling for a higher level of personal accountability. On March 20th Commissioner Bell,

Commissioner McFall, Manager Bryant and various employees from the Clerk's Office went on a tour of the Territorial Correction Facility. On March 22nd Sheriff Beicker and Manager Bryant attended interviews for subcontractors in Colorado Springs to move forward on the security piece of the jail project. On March 23rd various employees in the county attended the safety committee meeting.

b. Sales & Tax Report, Sunny Bryant, County Manager

Manager Bryant reported the January collections for Retail Sales Tax were \$312,641, Sheriff-Retail Sales Tax were \$208,427 and Lodging Tax were \$8,964. In February, the Auto Use Tax collected was \$75,454, Sheriff-Auto Use Tax was \$50,363, Construction Use Tax was \$10,046, and Sheriff-Construction Use Tax was \$6,697.

Commissioner Bell shared that she attended the "Question Behind the Question" event. The county helped to sponsor the presentation at no charge to anyone who wanted to attend. All employees in the county were offered the opportunity to attend. Commissioner Bell felt it was a very useful event in terms of personal responsibility.

Consideration of a Proclamation for Child Abuse Prevention Month in Fremont County

Mick Stumph talked about planning the event for several months, having great support and the opportunity to work with multiple agencies. A kickoff event has been added which will be held at the Rialto in Florence. There will also be a kickoff event at Macon Plaza in Cañon City. Both events will take place on April 7th starting at 5:30 pm. On April 1st Bikers Against Child Abuse will hold a candle-light vigil. Mick Stumph shared pin-wheel gardens are a great way to promote and support the awareness.

Commissioner Bell wanted everyone to know the pin-wheel gardens are available for homes and businesses. Commissioner Bell has a pin-wheel garden that will be put out to support the cause.

Mick Stumph read the proclamation.

2. Consideration to award bids for aggregate chip for the East Area chip seal program and for aggregate chip for the West Area chip seal program Representative: Tony Adamic, County DOT Director

Tony Adamic recommended the East Area bid and the West Area bid be awarded to Aggregate Source.

Commissioner McFall moved to approve the award bid for aggregate chip to the Aggregate Source at \$11.15 per ton for both the East and West Area chip seal program. Commissioner Payne seconded the motion. Upon Vote: Commissioner McFall, aye; Commissioner Payne, aye; Commissioner Bell, aye. The motion carried.

3. Consideration to award bid for Asphalt Mix Representative: Tony Adamic, County DOT Director

Tony Adamic recommended the award bid to Fremont Paving.

Commissioner Payne moved to approve the award bid for asphalt mix to Fremont Paving at \$52.00 per ton. Commissioner McFall seconded the motion. Upon Vote: Commissioner Payne, aye; Commissioner McFall, aye; Commissioner Bell, aye. The motion carried.

4. Consideration to award bid for Dust Guard Liquid Suppressant Representative: Tony Adamic, County DOT Director

Tony Adamic recommended the award bid to GMCO.

Commissioner McFall moved to award the bid for Dust Guard Liquid Suppressant to GMCO at \$0.67 per gallon. Commissioner Payne seconded the motion. Upon Vote: Commissioner McFall, aye; Commissioner Payne, aye; Commissioner Bell, aye. The motion carried.

5. Consideration to award bid for Emulsion Oil Representative: Tony Adamic, County DOT Director

Tony Adamic recommended the award bid for CRS-2P-2R to Suncor Energy and the HFMS award bid to Suncor Energy.

Commissioner Payne moved to approve the award bid for Emulsion Oil for CRS-2P-2R to Suncor Energy and the award bid for HFMS to Suncor Energy for prices listed dependent on the variable locations. Commissioner McFall seconded the motion. Upon Vote: Commissioner Payne, aye; Commissioner McFall, aye; Commissioner Bell, aye. The motion carried.

6. Consideration to award bid for Tack Oil Representative: Tony Adamic, County DOT Director

Tony Adamic recommended the award bid to Suncor Energy.

Commissioner McFall moved to approve the award bid for Tack Oil to Suncor Energy at \$1.71 per gallon. Commissioner Payne seconded the motion. Upon Vote: Commissioner McFall, aye; Commissioner Payne, aye; Commissioner Bell, aye. The motion carried.

7. Request for issuance of an Optional Premises Cultivation license for an indoor grow operation, Department file #OPC 14-005 Today's Health Care, LLC (Optional Premises Cultivation-Commercial, Greenhouse), by Today's Health Care, LLC, (dba Today's Health Care), for property which is owned by COAZ North, LLC. The address of the property is 1015 Highway 115, in the Beaver Park/Penrose Area, which is located on the north side of State Highway 115, approximately 492 feet to the center of the driveway, from the intersection of State Highway 115 and C Street, in the Beaver Park/Penrose Area. The property is zoned Business and contains 2.65 acres more or less.

Representative: Natalie Romolt/Angela Morton

Natalie Romolt explained that nothing has changed since last year and that nothing will be changing over the next year. There have been no odor or light complaints or violations. Natalie Romolt explained this building is used for propagation and is completely enclosed.

Director Koch reported a complete submittal with this being the 3^{rd} renewal for the site. There are no violations or concerns.

Sheriff's Deputy Sterling Jenkins reported that since the plants are in a vegetative state there have been no odor or light complaints or violations.

Commissioner Payne moved to approve the 2017 Renewal of OPC 14-005 Today's Health Care, LLC. Commissioner McFall seconded the motion. Upon Vote: Commissioner Payne, aye; Commissioner McFall, aye; Commissioner Bell, aye. The motion carried.

8. Consideration of a resolution and letter of support with a \$3,000 funding commitment to participate in the Colorado Department of Higher Education's Colorado Opportunity Scholarship Initiative

Commissioner Bell explained the county committed \$5,000 to this program last year. The program has received up to a \$50,000 grant from the State of Colorado for matching funds for low income students in Fremont County moving on to higher education or already receiving a higher education. Commissioner Bell stated the commissioners are supporting the program again. They will be committing \$3,000 to participate in the program.

Manager Bryant wanted to share there are counselors at Cañon City, Florence and Cotopaxi High Schools who have the applications for those who qualify for the scholarship. The local college has the applications as well. The deadline for these applications to be submitted is quickly approaching.

Commissioner McFall moved to approve Resolution #16 along with the letter of support for a \$3,000 funding commitment to participate in the Colorado Department of Higher Educations Colorado Opportunity Scholarship Initiative. Commissioner Payne seconded the motion. Upon Vote: Commissioner McFall, aye; Commissioner Payne, aye; Commissioner Bell, aye. The motion carried.

9. Consideration of an agreement with Nunn Construction for the security upgrade at the Fremont County Detention Center

Manager Bryant explained this project has been much needed. The first piece of the completed project was the kitchen and laundry. The second piece to the project is a complete security and electronics upgrade in the detention center. The project will be staying with Nunn Construction. The total maximum price will be \$1,685,974, with the biggest piece being the security upgrade which will cost \$819,000. Manager Bryant said this price is still under what is budgeted for the projects. If the contract is awarded, construction should start within the next couple weeks. The project should take 32 weeks to complete.

Commissioner Bell is excited the project is finally going to get accomplished.

Commissioner Payne wanted to point out this project is something that needed to be done for security purposes.

Commissioner Payne moved to approve the award bid to Nunn Construction for maximum amount of \$1,685,974 along with a notice of award. Commissioner McFall seconded the motion. Upon Vote: Commissioner Payne, aye; Commissioner McFall, aye; Commissioner Bell, aye. The motion carried.

10. Ratification of Chairman's signature on CDBG-DR Grant Application for the Oil Creek Ditch Flood Resiliency Project

Commissioner Payne shared this is a project he has been working on with the Arkansas River Round Table. This is a Community Development Block Grant through the Department Of Local Affairs. The funding is in regard to the aftermath of the Royal Gorge Fire. The total grant amount asked for is \$408,450 and the results should be known mid to end of May. The funding

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will be for working on the Diversion Dam and may include a raft chute. The design and engineering would be done by the Apple Gate Group. This will be a zero matching funds project.

Commissioner Bell stated it is very rare to see or get a 100 percent grant and is excited to see the outcome.

Commissioner Payne moved to ratify the Chairman's Signature on CDBG-DR Grant Application for the Oil Creek Ditch Flood Resiliency Project. Commissioner McFall seconded the motion. Upon Vote: Commissioner Payne, aye; Commissioner McFall, aye; Commissioner Bell, aye. The motion carried.

A RESOLUTION OF PARTNERSHIP TO APPLY FOR AND DISTRIBUTE MATCHING FUNDS FROM THE COLOADO OPPORTUNITY SCHOLARSHIPS PROGRAM TO BENEFIT RESIDENTS OF FREMONT COUNTY

WHEREAS, the State of Colorado, through the Colorado Opportunity Scholarship (COSI) has provided an opportunity for local counties to apply for scholarship support for students post- secondary education; and

WHEREAS, COSI has required that matching scholarship funds awarded to any county be deposited with and administered by a local representative non-profit community foundation; and

WHEREAS, COSI has required that matching scholarship funds will only be awarded to a county in which the student participants are engaged in a rigorous student success support program; and

WHEREAS, the provision of additional scholarship support, to offset the cost of attending postsecondary education and a vigorous student success support are critical to the continued economic competitiveness of Fremont County; and

WHEREAS, the Fremont Community Foundation serves as the non-profit fiscal agent to collect and disburse all monies secured locally in Fremont County for COSI scholarships; and

WHEREAS, a local committee of educators serves in an advisory capacity to the Fremont Community Foundation for the purpose of reviewing and awarding scholarships to qualifying students attending Cañon City High School, Florence High School, and Cotopaxi High School;

WHEREAS, the Fremont County Board of Commissioners agrees to support fiscal year 2017-2018 COSI funding in the amount of \$3,000; and

WHEREAS, any community fundraising and donations for COSI Scholarship matching dollars will be also be deposited with the Fremont Community Foundation;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of County Commissioners of Fremont County that \$3,000 is contributed by Fremont County in initial matching funds and to be deposited with the Fremont Community Foundation COSI Scholarship Fund.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Fremont Community Foundation will be responsible for the monitoring, distribution, and oversight of COSI scholarship awards. The scholarships to be awarded are for the post-secondary education of Fremont County high school graduates utilizing those county funds and any other community funds donated for the purpose of COSI scholarships.
